BOOK REVIEW: Women: Biology, Culture and Literature by Howard L. Schwartz, M.D.

As a reader, one of the things I enjoy tremendously about Dr. Howard L. Schwartz's books is the variety of topics he covers in each one. There is a cornucopia of ideas, revelations, humor, and Freudian perspectives that he brings to each book, and yet there is a singular theme that is particular to each published work. In *Women: Biology, Culture and Literature,* as a main theme, Dr. Schwartz explores the journeys of several women from the Goddess Athena, Queen Esther, and Ruth Bader Ginsburg to Dr. Christine Blasey Ford with an eye to the psychological and sociopolitical growth that results out of the necessity of their times.
